BULLETIN DESCRIPTION OF THE SCHOOL

To equip Seventh-day Adventists to be soul winners in their spheres of influence by educating them on theology, prophecy, practical and personal spirituality, and how to gain and give Bible studies.

PROGRAM & COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

The goal of this curriculum is to broaden the pool of faithful disciples of Jesus by training lay-ministers and Bible workers to serve in their communities and throughout the IA-MO Conference.

- "The minister's work is the lay member's work as well."—RH, July 9, 1895, paragraph 4.

The following **Course Learning Outcomes** contribute to this overall objective by identifying the key learnings to be achieved by diligent work in this course:

- 1. To learn how to: study the Bible for yourself, give a Bible study, preach quality sermons, strengthen one's own personal and family spiritual life, and to help others do the same.
- 2. To further understand apocalyptic Bible prophecy and the fundamental teachings of the Seventh-day Adventist (SDA) Church.



- 3. Present a biblically-based, well-organized, Christ (gospel)-centered response to those who have challenged the SDA understanding of Bible prophecy and our fundamental Bible-based beliefs.
- 4. Strengthen and increase leadership skills by learning conflict resolution techniques, team building principles, and how to work with the local church and its leadership.
- 5. To learn how to procure Bible studies with friends, family, and those in your community and how to do effective door-to-door work.
- 6. To learn about the cycle of evangelism for the local church.
- 7. NOTE: Employment in the IA-MO Conference is not a guaranteed outcome of graduation.

REQUIREMENTS BEFORE THE OPENING DAY OF CLASSES:

- 1. **Read the Summary Descriptions of the 28 Fundamental Beliefs:** <u>ADV-28Beliefs2020.pdf</u> This document is also included on the <u>www.imsda.org/imcalled</u> webpage.
- 2. Read Daniel and Revelation 2-3 times, preferably using a "Formal Equivalence" (more literal) translation: HCSB, ESV, KJV, NASB, NKJV, RSV.

REQUIREMENTS DURING THE TIME CLASSES ARE BEING CONDUCTED:

- 1. Attend all lectures and actively participate and engage in class discussions.
- 2. Participate in active Bible study procurement work, especially going door-to-door (i.e., cold call solicitation) and following up with interests and leads (i.e., warm call follow-up). **NOTE:** This school will be partnering with a local St. Louis area church for this type of outreach activity.
- 3. Take notes from class lectures and discussions, as you see fit, to help you.
- 4. Review the "Practical Christianity" Section (pp. 101-120) in Mark Finley's *Studying Together* by **Tuesday, June 24, 2025,** to prepare for the class on that day.
- 5. Select two Bible passages/topics, a different one for each of these two areas:

^{**}The above resources will be provided for you on the first day of class as part of your enrollment.**



- 1. Developing a sermon and 2. Creating a Bible study. You will need 1 different passage/topic for each of these methods of Biblical presentations.
- These can be a portion of a book, a psalm, a story, or a parable. You can potentially choose a topic (Sabbath, Salvation, Grace, Judgment etc.) instead of a passage.
- A topic (such as one of the 28 Fundamental Beliefs) would be ideal for the study portion. It is better suited for defending this belief during the "Hot Seat" portion of this school.
- Either a passage or topic would be fine for the sermon. However, it is best to preach sermons from one main passage.
- Near the end of the school year, you will then preach your sermon to the class and lead them in a Bible study (see criteria for grading on each of these below).
- Email/submit your passages/topics to Rob Alfalah by 7/10/2025.
- 6. Email/submit your Bible study outline to Rob Alfalah by 8/14/2025.
 - Outlines, although simple in nature, must still be able to communicate the content of the Bible study to the instructor. Paragraphs can be avoided.
 - 15-minute practicums to lead the class through this study begin no sooner than the week of **8/25/2025**.
- 7. Email/submit your sermon outline to **Rob Alfalah by 9/4/2025**. 20-minute practicums to preach this sermon to the class begin no sooner than the week of **9/15/2025**.

CONSIDERATIONS AND OPPORTUNITIES AFTER THE TIME CLASSES CONCLUDE:

- 1. Continue to work with the local church to follow-up with additional Bible study interests.
- 2. Lead these interests to the public evangelism campaign that will be scheduled when classes are completed. If possible, stay to help the local church with this series.
- 3. Continue to read and learn on various topics to strengthen the ministry God will/has/is giving you. The recommended reading list at the end of this syllabus is a resource to help you.

TOPICS TO BE COVERED DURING THE SCHOOL YEAR

Class Topic	Topic Description
Dive Deeper into Daniel and Revelation	This class will give the student a deeper understanding of these two apocalyptic prophecy books that will further affirm your faith in God, the Bible, and the last day message of the Seventh-day Adventist (SDA) Church.
28 Fundamental Beliefs of the SDA Church	The class will be using the <i>Seventh-day Adventist Beliefs</i> book to review the 28 Fundamental Beliefs of the SDA Church.
Apologetics	The student will be taught how to use the Bible to lovingly defend the fundamental beliefs of the SDA Church.
Prayer Life	The class will learn what prayer is and why it is important. They will the types of prayer that can be uttered and principles that can strengthen, rejuvenate, and revive their prayer lives.
Devotional Time	The student will learn how to strengthen their one-on-one time with Jesus to strengthen their walk with Him.
Family Worship	Strong families make strong churches. In this class, you will not only learn some practical ideas on how to conduct family worship. You will also learn principles that will allow you to tailor your family worship time to serve your family's needs.
How to Study the Bible	This class will give you the fundamental principles on how to study the Bible for yourself and really understand God's intention for the text. This will allow to study any passage, topic, or book of the Bible effectively.
How to Give a Bible Study	Here, the student will learn how to lead in Bible studies using pre-existing studies and even how to make their own. Students will also learn principles to help them be most effective when leading out in Bible studies with friends, family, and neighbors.
How to Deal with Sin	This class will help the student to Biblically, graciously, and lovingly deal with sin in the lives of those you are seeking to reach.
Practical Christianity	This class will deal with the practical, day to day walk with Christ covering topics such as discovering truth, how to make decisions, how to increase your faith, how to deal with anger, bitterness, and resentment and others.
Personal Evangelism and Witnessing	The instructor(s) will share with you timeless, Biblical principles on how to share your faith with non-SDA church members and the unchurched.
Cycle of Evangelism	This class will reveal some Bible-based principles on how to conduct a cycle of evangelism for the local church.
How to Write & Preach Sermons	This class will educate the student on how to prepare and preach effective sermons and to make appeals that will encourage people to make decisions for Jesus.
Church Planting	God calls His people to be fruitful, multiply, and scatter throughout the Earth. Although the context of that command is pro-creation, it is also for the church to grow and expand into new territories through church planting. This class will share some principles on how the local church can move forward in this endeavor.
Biblical Leadership	The greatest leaders (and Leader) this planet has ever known are found in the Bible. This class will highlight the timeless principles of leadership found in the Holy Writ.
Discipleship	Jesus calls us to be His disciples and to make disciples. This class will help the student to achieve both utilizing proven Biblical principles.
Peacemaking	"Blessed are the Peacemakers". This class will teach students the principles that will help them in conflict resolution at home, work, and in the church.
Church Organization	This class will give the history of church organization in the SDA church including its Protestant roots and how we can remain a Protestant Church today.
The Bible Worker's Toolbox	This class will teach how to find, & win souls to God's Kingdom. This includes proven tactics based on "Christ's Method Alone", including knocking on doors, sharing your personal testimony, overcoming objections, calling for decisions and more!

ABOUT YOUR INSTRUCTORS

Rob Alfalah has been employed by the IA-MO Conference since 2009 where he served as pastor during his first 13 years in this field. From 2021 – 2024, Rob served as Conference Executive Secretary. He now serves as Conference Evangelist and Bible instructor for the *IM Called School of Evangelism and Discipleship*.

Rob was born in Detroit, Michigan to Iraqi immigrants. His parents' ethnicity is Assyrian or Chaldean. This group represents a Christian minority in Iraq in contrast to the vastly Muslim-Arab population of that country. Yet they have a rich history dating back thousands of years. Although his family wasn't very religious, he was raised a Christian, attending Catholic school through eighth grade. He attended college at Central Michigan University (CMU), where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree. It was here at CMU that he attended a public evangelism campaign, accepted Christ and the last day message He has for this fallen world and was baptized as a Seventh-day Adventist.

Prior to being hired as a full-time pastor for the IA-MO Conference, Rob worked for ten years in corporate America. During this time, he joined a young and vibrant, lay-driven church that helped him understand that all members have a responsibility to serve in ministry—regardless of their occupation. He led regular Bible studies with unchurched people, was a speaker for several public evangelism campaigns, and led in various church offices and ministries.

Jeremy Clark started in Conference Ministry as a Bible Worker for "It is Written" in 2019. He transitioned to pastoral Ministry is late 2020. He currently serves in the IA-MO Conference as an ordained Pastor at the Mid-Rivers Church in St. Peters, MO, Conference Bible Worker Director, and a Bible Worker instructor for the *IM Called School of Evangelism and Discipleship*.

Born in Woodbury TN, his grandmother Edith was a Seventh-day Adventist and his core spiritual influence as a child. After high school Jeremy married his grade school sweetheart Torrie Lynn and began a career in management working with fortune 500 Companies such as Gateway Computers & Fed-Ex Office.

God had long been pulling on Jeremy's heart to serve Him and seven years after relocating his family from California to Missouri, both Jeremy, Torrie, and their children (Christopher, Shelby, and Samuel) were baptized July 7, 2013. Jeremy had the honor of baptizing Isabella, their youngest daughter, on December 25th, 2021.

THE A GRADE

An A grade is given when a student not only fulfills the criteria for a B grade, but in doing so demonstrates an advanced aptitude for content knowledge, critique, synthesis and independent insight, while exhibiting highly developed communication skills.

THE B GRADE

The B grade is a sign that you have competently fulfilled all the requirements stipulated for an assessment or competency evaluation. It is a very good grade and demonstrates a high level of knowledge, insight, critical competence and professional presentation standards that are essential for a leader in ministry.

THE C GRADE

The C grade differs only from a B grade in that the traits outlined in the B grade above are not consistently applied. However, with diligence and by applying feedback from your instructor(s), the process can provide opportunity for a student to improve their consistency, and hence, their grade.

THE D GRADE

The D grade points to a limited level of knowledge, insight, and critique, as well as to inadequate quality of written work. This may be due to lack of time management on the part of the student, difficulty grasping the concepts being taught, use of English as a second language, or a personal issue that is affecting one's concentration and motivation levels. Again, with diligence and applying feedback from your instructor(s), the process can provide an opportunity for a student to significantly improve.

THE F GRADE

A failing grade is given when very limited or no demonstrable competency has been observed.
